I would like to take this opportunity to thank all my dear staff, board members, national and international donors, and well-wishers for making 2016 a sensational year for Nepal Orthopedic Hospital. We devoted our time and effort into recovering, regrouping and strengthening our team and extensively planning for further infrastructure development.

I feel proud to inform that we were able to provide a total amount of Rs. 5963370 as charity to our underprivileged patients. We were still actively treating the patients who had unfortunately been injured in the earthquakes or aftershocks of 2015. Some earthquake victims needed revision surgeries while others needed their implants to be removed, all were done from partial to full charity depending upon the financial need.



We have put our sincere efforts in expanding and enhancing our services. We have started polyclinic (physician, Radiology, Cardiology and Psychiatry) services as the evening OPD, backed by USG/ Echo facilities. The new emergency room which was highly anticipated became operational this year; fulfilling a 100 bedded hospital's must have criteria. Finally, we added a sophisticated BMD diagnostic tool in our armoury.

We have regularly been conducting outreach surgical camps to uplift the health status of our remote villages. This year, we have successfully conducted numerous OPD orthopedic camps in major earthquake stricken areas as well as routine surgical camps in Jajarkot, Ramechhap, Taplejung, and Myagdi.

OPD CAMPS

Jhapa Opd Camp

About: Jhapa is an inner-Terai district in Mechi zone of south-eastern Nepal. Under the new federal division, the district lies in Province No. I. The district is divided into 37 Village Development Committees (VDC) and 8 municipalities. The latest official data, 2011 Nepal Census, puts the total population of the district at 812,650. An inhabitant of Jhapa is known as a Jhapali. The district headquarters is Bhadrapur.

Location: Jhapa is the easternmost district of Nepal and lies in the fertile Terai plains. It is bound by Ilam in the north, Morang in the west, the Indian state of Bihar in the south and another Indian state of West Bengal to the southeast and east. Geographically, it covers an area of 1,606 km2 (620 sq mi).

Climate: Jhapa observes moderate climate complexion as it lies in the Indo-Gangetic plain and Churia low hills. Though due to close proximity to the lower Himalaya, the weather is calm throughout the year. Seasonal monsoon is well distributed across the district. The temperature is highest during May through September, though winter is not extreme, keeping aside fogging during mornings. Climatic variation is not extreme; however, the southern parts of districts are warmer than the northern ones.

SURGICAL CAMPS

Beni, Myagdi Surgical Camp

NOH has been regularly organizing free surgical health camps throughout the rural parts of Nepal. One of the goals of NOH is to reach out to the people in need of orthopedic care and treatments in rural and inaccessible parts of the country through health camps. Nepal Orthopedic Hospital successfully organized a free surgical health camp in District Hospital, Beni, the district headquarter of Myagdi in the western region from 15 to 17 April 2016, sponsored by Borken Rotary Club, Lions Club Borken and Soroptimist International (Germany). Mr. Remy Eunhaus has played an instrumental role in organizing the camp.

It is 303 km from Kathmandu. The health camp was intended to provide free medical and surgical Orthopaedic services to locals from the four surrounding districts, Myagdi, Parbat, Mustang and Baglung.

On 14 April 2016, a team of 12 members, led by Dr. Yubaraj Kharel landed in Pokhara airport at 09:00 am and other 2 members joined the team at Pokhara. It was about 3 hours drive from Pokhara and finally reached Beni by 1:30 pm.

The local partners welcomed us on April 14th, 2016. And, by 2:00 pm, doctors started examining patients



till 06:00 pm and screened patients to schedule surgery for next day. Nurses started setting up Operation Theater and required logistics. We were able to check 44 patients and collected 13 cases for surgery next day.

There was a formal welcome and inauguration program on April 15th 2016. The Chief District Officer of Myagdi district and Dr. Yubaraj Kharel, jointly inaugurated the camp with enthusiasm and promised to provide the Orthopaedic health service to as many people as possible through the camp. It was overwhelming to see large number of people queued; there were several patients who walked all the day to make it to the camp, and had heard about the camp through radio, television and newspaper.

We were able to check 320 patients from I year to 78 years with various orthopedic ailments. The major problems that were diagnosed were Degenerative spine diseases, osteoarthritis of knee joint, congenital deformities (syndactyly, clubbed foot, hemimelia), acquired deformities (cubitus valgus, madlung's deformity, cubitus varus, flexion deformities of fingers). We also successfully operated 13 patients and applied posterior slabs in two patients having fractures and injected local steroids in 14 patients.

On the second day, the first case of the day started with corrective osteotomy for non-union fracture lateral condyle of right humerus with cubitus valgus deformity in 15 years old female child. We checked 300 patients, injected local steroids in 14 patients and completed 14 surgeries within 08:00 pm.

On the final day for checkup, we had more pressure as it was the last day and we did not want to leave any patients untreated. The morning passed by, so did the day, by the end of the day we completed the queue, we performed 9 surgeries with one long leg cast applied for fracture tibia in a 4 year male child and local steroid injections in 7 patients. We finished early at 5 pm, than packed our logistics to leave the other day.

That same night, the local community organized a thanks giving and farewell program to our team. In the program, the local social workers appreciated the work we did, and thanked us for being there to support the locals in rural districts of Nepal. Many other locals thanked us at the same time and also requested us, to come again and carry out similar free health camps to provide required orthopedic care for the locals who would never dream to afford the same. Our team leader, DrYubaraj Kharel also thanked the local partners, community members for supporting the cause, and appreciated each individual's role in successful completion of the camp. He also expressed NOH's keen interest in coming back to the community with similar camps though the resources and logistics remained a big challenge.

Through our three days of health camp, we were able to check 750 out patients mostly having problems related to degenerative spine disease, osteoarthritis of hip and knee joint, mechanical low back pain, fibromyalgia, bursitis, chronic osteomyelitis, diabetic neuropathy, osteoporotic pain, post trauma deformity and joint stiffness, post-operative joint stiffness and complications, frozen shoulder, tennis elbow, golfer's elbow, trigger finger, Dupuytren's contracture, planter fascitis, ganglion, non-union of fractures, congenital deformities-syndactyly, clubbed foot, andperformed 36 surgeries among them, applied 3 cast/slab for fresh trauma cases and 35 steroid injections for tennis elbow, frozen shoulder, planter fasciitis, ganglion, Dequervain's tenosynovitis, osteoarthritis of knee, keloid and tendon enthesopathy. We were also able to distribute all required medicines as prescribed and investigations as adviced for free of cost.

The success of this camp was possible because all the team members were committed to the cause and worked continuously and Mr. Alex and his friends' commitment and contribution to the camp.

A surgical camp in Ramechap Since the inception, Nepal Orthopaedic Hospital (NOH) has been providing quality orthopaedic and trauma care to the needy and underpriviledged people of the country. This camp at PHC Manthali, Ramechhap was organized by Nepal Orthopaedic Hospital with the financial assistance from Dr Katrin Hagen with R C St. Moritz, Switzerland.

Ramechhap falls under Janakpur Zone, The district, known as Kirat Ramechhap, with Manthali as its district headquarters, covers an area of 1,546 km² and has a population of 202,646 and a density of 137.4 per km². The district has the highest population of endangered native group the Kusundas and the Majhis (indigenous tribes who have been marginalized).

Brief Overview of Surgical Camp

Dayl

The team left Kathmandu on 27th, Jan 2016 early morning 7:00 AM, from NOH, Jorpati. Two jeeps belonging to NOH took all the team members on a five hour journey to Manthali. A huge truck had already left for Manthali with all the medical equipment including anaesthesia machines and generators and beds and surgical equipment a day before. That same afternoon, the Operation theater and a post-operative ward was set up in a tent with ten beds and mattresses.

Day2

Next day 150 OPD patients were seen and some patients were admitted for surgery and free medicines



were distributed. 9 surgereis were done and a list was prepeared for the surgery next day.

Day 3

More OPD patients were seen and 14 surgeries were done.

Day4

Even more patients were seen and 14 more surgeries were conducted. Many children with burn contractures and hand deformities were seen. As the set-up was not very ideal, complicated surgeries were avoided and these patients were referred to NOH. They were promised of free traveling cost and surgery.

Day 5

14 more surgeries were conducted. Long queues of patients were seen and given free consultation and free medications.

Day 6

6 surgeries were done and OPD consultation was limited till the afternoon and pack-up was done.

All camp material was brought down to the waiting truck for returning to NOH.

Day7

Returned to Kathmandu by road.

Taplejung is the mountainous district of Province No. I situated in northeastern Nepal. The district covers 3,646 km2 (1,408 sq mi). The 2011 census counted 127,461 populations.

The name Taplejung is derived from the name Taple and the word jung. Taple was the medieval Limbu king who used to rule the area and jung in the Limbu language means fort. Literally, Taplejung means Fort of King Taple.

The Tamur River flows through the district. The area is famous for Kanchenjunga – the third highest mountain in the world. The district is one of the most beautiful areas in eastern Nepal with spectacular landscapes, Himalayan peaks and a wide range of flora and fauna. Alpine grassland, rocky outcrops, dense temperate and subtropical forests and river valleys make up the region.

The next morning after a quick breasfast, the logistic team hired next set of 2 jeeps and all cew members made on a 4 hours drive to reach Taplejung.

A truckload of medical equipment including anaesthesia machines and generators, surgical beds and surgical equipment had already left for Taplejung couple of days before. After lunch, the Operation Theater was set up and a post-operative ward was set up in the district hospital.

Day2

Next day OPD patients were seen and screened for surgery and some patients were admitted for surgery and free medicines were distributed. Around One hundred and fourty patients were seen that day and 3 surgeries were done and some patients were arranged for surgery the next day.

Day 3

More patients were seen and 10 surgeries were done. Dr Katrin Hagen along with photographer Mr Min Bajracharya joined the team and assisted doctors to screen and consult hand cases

Day4

More OPD patients were examined and 13 more surgeries including conservative cast application were

conducted. Many children with burn contractures and hand deformities were screened.

Day 5

16 more surgeries were conducted. Long queues of patients were seen and given free consultation and free medications.

Day 6

14 surgeries were conducted, started from 8 am and was limited to 2 pm

Day 2

Next day overwhelming number of 200 OPD patients was examined and free medicine was distributed and patients were admitted for surgery. We were able to perform 14 surgeries. More patients were admitted for next day's surgery.

Day 3

We performed 13 surgeries and more patients were examined in OPD.

Day4

12 more surgeries were performed. Many children with burn contractures and hand deformities were seen and operated.

Day 5

13 more surgeries were conducted. Long queues of 450 patients were seen and given free consultation and medications.

Day 6

We were able to execute 19 surgeries on the last day of the camp and OPD consultation was limited till

the afternoon as pack-up had to be started. All the materials were carried down to the waiting truck for returning to NOH.

Day 7

The team returned to Nepalgunj by road, spent a night in there and flew to Kathmandu next day.





Though he could not manage the cost, he was admitted. 2 stages of surgeries were planned. First surgery was open osteoclasis (a surgery to disengage the fracture). Followed by the fixation with distal femoral locking plate after 15 days. During his hospital stay, he was provided 4 meals a day and medicineswere made available for free by the hospital.

The entire treatment was carried out under charity. He was full of smiles during discharge.

Distribution of Admitted Patients According to District (1998-2016)


